My experience in parish ministry at St. Alban's (23 years) and other parishes (10 years), together with my professional vocation (40 years) in international development, complement one another to meet four key responsibilities of a vestry member – leadership; management; governance; caring for worship life of parish.

I strive to deepen my spiritual and theological life in anything I undertake, such as: study (e.g. core curriculum, Wednesday bible study, monthly gatherings of Benedictine cell); ministry (e.g. Washington Home, lay reader, delivering homilies); or committee (e.g. GWW, Governance, TLC/DC, Transformation Grants). Each represents a 'call' to listen, learn, and 'do,' praying the action reflects gratitude and my relationship with a loving God.

My professional vocation is dedicated to education – domestically and globally. I managed large-scale, multi-partner projects in the USA, Africa and Egypt. The focus was to improve the quality of teaching and learning for disenfranchised groups of children (e.g. gender; economic circumstances, ethnicity). Examples of skills required to lead and manage such projects include: strategic planning and long-range vision; bringing people from diverse backgrounds and interests to the 'table'; recognizing that each has something to give and each has something to receive; reaching common ground; closing activities within budget and on schedule; and examining my own motivations.

For three years, I led the reconstituted Outreach Committee (mission & ministry outside the parish walls) to facilitate ongoing outreach ministries. A broader, more challenging mandate was to produce an integrated, deeper approach to outreach. This "rethink" resulted in a new governing structure, that represented a coordinated, planful approach (WSA; Gala; Mustard Seed; Operating Budget) to outreach mission and ministry. Our activities included a parish survey, and an overview of mission funding from 2009-2013. The overview shows trends, sources, and focus of funding from: WSA; Mustard Seed; Gala and the Operating Budget (the analysis reflects trends by population; type of ministry & geography). The vestry-approved (2014) governing structure is God's Work in the World and a ministry mission to "Transform the Lives of Children through Education."

As a member of the Welcome committee to greet our priest-in-charge, I was moved by the energy and fellowship of our gatherings. How important it is for all of us to actively engage in a climate of parish hospitality to one another, especially to new members, to live and grow together in a fellowship of faith!

I had come from an Army base in Georgia, where my dad had just returned from commanding a battalion in Viet Nam, to a school and region that were aflame with enthusiasm for Gene McCarthy's antiwar campaign. The lesson has stood me in good stead, as I've spent most of my adult life as a litigation attorney -- which means interacting almost daily with people who disagree with me!
